Water Efficient Methods for Your Landscape

I think everyone is very aware of the severe drought Texas is under. It not only has affected area farmers and ranchers, but also homeowners. Many homeowners are seeing their landscapes wither due to lack of rainfall and a warm winter and spring. And another result: burn bans. It is only a matter of time our water bills will skyrocket and water companies begin to ask homeowners to conserve water through water rationing.

To help alleviate landscape water problems this summer and in the future, homeowners should be evaluating water conservation methods. Whether called "Xeriscape," "Water Smart," or "Water Wise," landscape water conservation can produce quality landscapes that conserve water and protect the environment. Water-efficient landscapes are a viable alternative to the conventional, high-water requirement landscapes. For the past several years, residential and commercial landscapes have utilized more than 25 percent of the total water consumption in urban areas of Texas. This percentage can be reduced to extend the water supplies of Texas. By incorporating water conserving principles into home or commercial landscapes, it is estimated that water usage can be cut in half.

Many of us think that water-efficient landscapes are cactus and rock gardens. They can be cool, green landscapes full of beautiful plants which are maintained with water efficient practices. The same green, Texas-style landscapes which we are accustomed to can be achieved and still conserve water.

Landscape water conservation incorporates seven basic principles which lead to water savings:

- Planning and design
- Soil analysis and improvement
- Appropriate plant selection
- Practical turf areas
- Efficient irrigation
- Use of mulches
- Appropriate maintenance
